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### Letter from the Senior Director

Dear Juntos partners and family,

Thank you for supporting Juntos in the 2023–2024 school year. Your investment helped us grow our program and deepen career exploration for our youth. We increased participation by over 43% and strengthened our Career Pathways focus. Through the Juntos YEA project (supported by USDA-NIFA) and the YES Resilience program (supported by UNC-CH Institute for the Environment, NSF), Juntos NC expanded youth career exploration in Agriculture and Environmental Science. We also initiated partnerships to build on a health career exploration curriculum.

In August 2024, six Land Grant Universities—Washington, Idaho, Wisconsin, Texas, and North Carolina—joined the National Juntos Consortium (NJC) to advance sustainable programming, research, and culturally responsive practices nationally. As we enter a new season, we remain focused on empowering youth and families to Cultivate their Future.

### **Juntos Program Summary**

The Juntos Program (pronounced "Who-n-toes"), meaning "Together" in Spanish, is dedicated to uniting community partners in order to equip students in grades 8 through 12, along with their families, with the knowledge, skills, and resources needed to ensure high school graduation and broaden postsecondary academic and career opportunities.

Launched in 2007, the program was born out of a survey conducted among Latino students and their families, revealing a critical need for greater understanding of the educational system. Today, Juntos serves all students and families, offering a comprehensive program that includes Family Engagement, 4-H clubs, academic success coaching, and an annual Summer Academy.

In recent years, Juntos has expanded to include workforce development initiatives, encouraging high school students to explore both college and career pathways. The program's success is made possible through the collaborative efforts of Extension's 4-H and Family & Consumer Sciences (FCS) agents, K-12 school systems, post-secondary institutions, and community volunteers, creating a sustainable and impactful model that continues to thrive in communities across the United States.



This report presents the outcomes of the Juntos program in North Carolina for the **2023-2024** academic year.

### **What Did Juntos** Do in 2023-2024?

Juntos engaged students and families in every program component:

### Juntos 4-H Club

Juntos 4-H Clubs focus on career exploration, community service, college campus tours, and field trips to increase college readiness and sense of belonging in students' schools and communities. Clubs can happen during school or afterschool and each club is led by a group of elected student officers with the Juntos Coordinator as the adult advisor.

### **Family Engagement Events**

Family Engagement Events include a five-week or six-week workshop series and additional family events designed to empower families and increase engagement in their students' educational journey. Family Nights feature guest speakers that introduce resources and networking connections to both the students and the families that attend.

### **Success Coaching**

One-on-One Success Coaching involves monitoring academic progress during one-on-one meetings between Juntos Coordinators and youth. Students are guided towards achieving personalized academic and career goals. Individual coaching sessions happen at least once a month and follow a plan created by the student and the coordinator.

### **Summer Programming**

Summer Programming includes students having the opportunity to attend the Juntos Summer Academy held in June at North Carolina State University, where students gain valuable skill sets, explore careers, and prepare presentations to showcase their week-long project. In 2024's Summer Academy, Juntos also hosted parents for the Saturday closing event.

### Who Did Juntos Serve in 2023-2024?

More than two-thirds (71%) of the students participating in Juntos were traditional public High School students. Another 17.5% were in Cooperative Innovative High Schools (often referred to as "Early Colleges"). Cooperative Innovative High Schools are small public high schools, usually located on the campus of a university or community college, firstgeneration college students, and/or students who would benefit from accelerated learning opportunities. The remaining 11.5% of Juntos students were in traditional public middle schoolers.

In 2023 - 2024, Juntos served 470 students students and their families, across eight counties.



### Where are our graduated seniors now?

In 2024, Juntos had 90 seniors graduate from high school and 63 of them (70%) enrolled in some kind of higher education institution. 13% (8 of 63) of students enrolled in a public four-year university, while 9% (5 of 63) of students enrolled in a private four-year university. However, 78% (49 of 63) of youth that enrolled in higher education after graduating high school enrolled in a community college. Community colleges allow youth to stay local after high school, are affordable in comparison to four-year institutions, and offer a broad range of two-year degrees and certifications.

### What was the Impact of Juntos on Students?

### **Career and College Readiness**

Youths valued learning about college options, scholarships, financial aid, and career pathways. They appreciated mentoring and guidance in preparing for their future education.

### **Personal Growth and Confidence**

Many of the students noted that Juntos helped them build self-confidence. perseverance, and motivation. They learned to advocate for themselves, explore new opportunities, and embrace their identity.

### **Community and Family Bonding**

Many of the students emphasized making new friends, bonding with mentors, and feeling part of a supportive community. Juntos also strengthened their relationships with family members, particularly through shared learning experiences.





In particular, among high school juniors and seniors, many more knew how to apply and pay for college at the end of the year than they had at the beginning of the school year.



### Juntos students demonstrated high levels of academic rigor and achievement.

- ▶ For 2023-2024, the average weighted GPA for Juntos students was 3.0, well above the minimum required of 2.5 for admission to the University of North Carolina system. The average unweighted GPA for Juntos students was 2.85.
- ▶ 65% of high school students were enrolled in Honors classes, 14% in AP courses, and 24% in college courses.1
- ▶ 100% of high school seniors graduated, with 69% enrolling in a 2- or 4-year college/university program.<sup>2</sup>

#### Student Evaluation Data and Methods

The data above is drawn from surveys administered to students at the beginning and end of the academic year, student transcripts, and program attendance records. Quotes are from open-ended questions on the post-test survey. Response rates were 59% (n=270) for the pre-survey and 63% (n=290) for the post-survey.

### **College Readiness**

Parents want their children to be prepared for college by learning about universities, financial aid, and scholarships, as well as opportunities within colleges.

### Family Support and Involvement

Some parents expressed that Juntos helps strengthen family connections as they noted how important parent involvement is.

### Social and Community Engagement

Building strong social connections and community engagement is important to parents, as they want to learn about opportunities to be involved in their community.



#### Parent Evaluation Data and Methods

Data from parents is drawn from a pre-survey and a post-survey administered to parents. The surveys consisted of Likert-Scale and open-ended questions designed to measure the impact of Juntos on parents.

### Summer Academy

In June 2024, the Juntos Program hosted Summer Academy, during which 9th to 12th grade Juntos students from across the state spent five days at North Carolina State University, experiencing campus as college students. Attendees work closely with college students, professionals, and staff, and have opportunities to network and learn about different career pathways and essential post-secondary skills. Throughout the week, students also participated in a College Fair, a Business Mixer, and a field trip to Wake Technical Community College. The majority of youth time was spent participating in a project through the week, tackling a challenge question in topics like technology, agriculture, environmental science, and engineering.

The 2024 Summer Academy saw 114 students from eight North Carolina counties participate in Juntos' summer programming.



By the end of the Summer Academy, students reported having much greater confidence in their networking and communication skills, and their college readiness.



#### **Summer Academy Evaluation Data and Methods**

The data above is based on a pre-test and post-test survey administered to students at the beginning and end of Summer Academy, respectively. The survey consisted of agree/disagree, Likert-scale, before/after, and open-ended questions designed to measure the impact of the Academy workshops and activities. Response rates for the pre-academy survey was 91% (n=104), and 93% (n=106) for the post-academy survey.

### Bladen County Highlights



Juntos students from Bladen Early College, East Bladen, and West Bladen participated in a college visit to Fayetteville State University. Students were informed about the different minors and majors offered along with scholarships. Students expressed being excited to see dorms as some have not seen dorms before. Students also experienced eating in the university cafeteria.



Students created extreme heat kits for farmworkers in Southeast NC, in partnership with NC Extension's Roberto Rosales. Through the YES Resilience curriculum, our students learned about extreme heat and its dangers on our migrant farmworkers. Students helped create personalized gift cards to pass out to migrant agricultural workers. One student wrote, "Hola, quiero decirle que tengo mucho respeto por lo que hacen. Mi papá también era migrante de agricultura entonces yo conozco que difícil es. Gracias por todo lo que hacen." This service project helps student connect with their culture and create something special for members of their community.





### **County Highlights**



Seniors from Sampson Early College Juntos presented at the Sampson County 4-H Achievement Night. The Juntos students focused their discussion around what Juntos is, what it means to them, and the projects they have successfully completed through Juntos 4-H. The Juntos program in Wake County launched in 2014. The program is supported by funding from a partnership with Wake Tech Community College, which funds a full time coordinator at East Wake High School and Neuse River Middle School, allowing for all four components of Juntos to be facilitated for these schools. The Vernon Malone Business Advisory Committee funds the Family Engagement component of the program at VMCCA, and 4-H Club is facilitated with the assistance of Federal Work Study students from NC State through the State Juntos Program. Knightdale High School's program is brand new and funded through a USDA-NIFA grant provided by the Juntos State office.

### County Highlights





Students from Vernon Malone College and Career Academy spent several hours at Yates Mill Pond to test the water quality as part of the Yes Resilience curriculum. Students tested the water, explored the park and had a picnic lunch. Afterward, the group stopped at the NCSU Creamery on the way back to school for ice cream. This project allowed students to learn about the quality of water and hypothesize on reasons for the results and possible solutions.



In April 2024, Neuse River Juntos held a Voices of Diversity panel discussion tailored for Hispanic middle school students. Through the narratives and testimonials shared by Juntos alumni, high school and college students, graduates, and professionals in the fields of STEM and agriculture, our students were offered invaluable glimpses into the opportunities that they can pursue in the future.



In April, students from East Wake High School visited the University of North Carolina at Wilmington and the Centro Hispano. Students were shown many opportunities that exist on campus for the Hispanic population. From academic support to cultural enrichment, this experience fostered a sense of belonging and empowerment among the students.
